#### <u>PART 1</u>

#### 1.1 Purpose:

The purpose of the report is to seek approval from Cabinet to accept grant funding from the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) of £228,503 towards the extension of the business start-up service delivered by the Business Factory project.

#### 1.2 Recommendation(s):

It is recommended that Cabinet:

- 1. authorise the Chief Executive as the s.151 Officer to accept the offer of the grant of £228,503 from the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) on terms which are approved by the Head of law and Governance;
- 2. authorise the Head of Business and Economic Development in consultation with the Cabinet Member for Economic Development, the Chief Executive as the s.151 Officer, the Cabinet Member for Economic Development and the Head of Law and Governance to take all necessary steps to deliver the extended business start-up programme.

#### 1.3 Forward Plan:

Twenty eight days notice of this report has been given and it first appeared on the Forward Plan that was published on 7 July 2014.

#### 1.4 Council Plan and Policy Framework

This report relates to the following themes/programmes/projects in the 2014-18 Council Plan (Our North Tyneside).

Our Economy will have the right conditions to support investment and create new jobs, especially apprenticeships.

We will do this by delivering an effective programme of business start-up support for new businesses.

#### 1.5 Current Position

North Tyneside Council's business start-up service, which is delivered under the Business Factory project name, is based in the North Tyneside Business Centre (Howard House) in North Shields and delivers the following services:

- Start-up advice and guidance
- Business planning
- Business ideas generation
- Grants and funding support
- School enterprise
- Social enterprise support
- Expert support: marketing, social media, property, ICT
- New product development
- Events and workshops

In 2013/14 the Business Factory project supported over 2,000 residents with enterprise advice and support and helped to establish 423 new businesses.

The Business Factory project has been nationally recognised by the Department for Business innovation and Skills (BIS) for its work in supporting local entrepreneurs and received a 'Highly Commended' award in the Enterprising Britain Awards 2014. The prestigious awards celebrate activity that stimulates new businesses to start-up and are part of the Government's drive to increase entrepreneurship activity in the UK.

The Business Factory project has been in receipt of ERDF funding, since April 2009. The current ERDF funding, which covers 50% of the project costs, is due to end on 31 December 2014. The Council was approached by DCLG in February 2014 to submit an expression of interest to extend the project for a further 9 months utilising unallocated ERDF resources.

#### 1.5.1 Funding Application Outcome

Following consideration of the Expression of Interest by DCLG, an offer of £228,503 ERDF funding was then received from DCLG to extend the project to 30 September 2015 with the same pro-rata budget and output commitments as the existing project.

#### 1.5.2 Project Outcomes

The Business Factory project is on target to significantly exceed all of the ERDF outcomes and the extended project will enable the continued delivery of this valuable service to North Tyneside residents. The project helps to create over 500 new jobs per annum and supports a stronger, more diverse economy in North Tyneside with the significant number of new businesses created.

The 423 business start-ups created in 2013/14 is the highest rate of enterprise support on record in North Tyneside. The data from the Office for National Statistics (ONS) in the table below shows that significant progress has made since the project commenced in 2009 but highlights that, whilst the gap between North Tyneside and the national average is closing, there is still a need for this project.

#### 1.5.3 Financial Breakdown

A breakdown of the financing of the revenue project for the 9 months from January 2015 to September 2015 can be summarised as follows:-

#### 1.5.4 Timescales

Should Cabinet give approval to accept this grant there will be no break in service delivery and the extended project will commence on 1 January 2015 and end on 31 September 2015. This will give sufficient time to consider the future delivery of the project in line with the Creating a Brighter Future Programme.

#### **1.6 Decision options:**

The following decision options are available for consideration by Cabinet:

Option 1

Cabinet may approve the recommendations set out in paragraph 1.2 of this report to accept the offer of ERDF funding and delegate authority to deliver the project.

#### Option 2

Cabinet may reject the grant offer and North Tyneside Council may continue to invest in a reduced business start-up service.

#### Option 3

Cabinet may reject the grant offer and North Tyneside Council may cease delivery of the business start-up service.

#### **1.7** Reasons for recommended option:

Option 1 is recommended for the following reasons:

Accepting the ERDF grant offer will provide the resources needed to deliver a comprehensive business start-up programme. Significant progress has been made since the commencement of the project in 2009 to close the gap between North Tyneside and the national average but there is still some way to go.

The North East traditionally falls behind the rest of the UK in business creation rates and the project has already proven its value in closing the gap and creating record breaking numbers of new businesses and job opportunities, achieving national recognition from the Department of Business, Innovation and Skills (BIS) Enterprising Britain competition.
