Appendix 1 – Engagement and consultation outcomes

Between 13 September and the 31 October 2016 a consultation exercise was carried out on the Council Tax Discounts for empty properties from 2017/18.

North Tyneside Council ensured that a variety of methods were used to ensure interested people knew about the consultation and could take part.

This included a wide range of options for example through our Customer Services Centres, Citizens Advice Bureau, outreach sessions in the community and with specific groups as well as briefings, established meetings including those with members, staff and external partners.

Additionally we also used newsletters, the resident's magazine, website, email contacts to the community and voluntary sector, Housing Associations and private landlords and social media.

Through our community and voluntary sector partners, consultation was planned to raise awareness of the consultation with those with specific equalities characteristics (as set out in the 2010 Equality Act) such as those with a disability.

Customers visiting our Customer Services and Citizens Advice Bureau were asked at their face to face engagement and at CAB through telephone contact as well as face to face to take part in the consultation. Customers were provided with help to complete the on line form where it was needed.

Method

The consultation consisted of three questions and an opportunity to provide additional comment via an on line form although paper forms were used where internet connectivity was not available or where people had a preference. Each paper survey was then input into the on line web form.

The consultation was carried out anonymously and no identifying data was collected. Equality monitoring questions were asked around age, disability and ethnic origin.

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Equality Monitoring Questions

The key statistics about North Tyneside's residents show that:

- 19% are aged 65 years and over. (Source: ONS 2014 mid-year population estimate)
- 4.9% are from black and minority ethnic (BME) communities the main groups being 'Other White' (1.2%), Indian (0.5%) and Chinese (0.4%). (2011 Census)
- 21% have a disability or condition which limits their day-to-day activities. (2011 Census)

As the findings below show 11% of the respondents were aged 65 years or over, slightly lower than the borough average of 19%, however as those of working age will be impacted by the changes being considered it was important to ensure they were well represented.

The proportion of participants from black or minority ethnic communities, and of those with a disability or limiting condition were similar to the borough average.
