#### 1. Purpose:

This report seeks the Board's approval to arrangements whereby the Council's Adult Social Care, Health & Wellbeing Sub-Committee undertakes the monitoring and scrutiny of the delivery of the Better Care Fund Plan on behalf of the Board.

## 2. Recommendation(s):

The Board is recommended to agree to the Adult Social Care Health & Wellbeing Sub-Committee undertaking the monitoring of the delivery of the Better Care Fund Plan.

#### 3. Policy Framework

The Better Care Fund relates to the following objectives in the North Tyneside Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy 2013-2023:

- To continually seek and develop new ways to improve the health and wellbeing of the population;
- To reduce the difference in life expectancy and healthy life expectancy between the most affluent and most deprived areas of the borough;
- To shift investment to focus on evidence based prevention and early intervention;
- To build resilience in local communities through focussed interventions and ownership of local initiatives to improve health and wellbeing; and
- To integrate services where there is an opportunity for better outcomes for the public and better use of public money.

#### 4. Information:

At its meeting on 19 March 2015 the Board received a report outlining the performance measures against which the delivery of the Better Care Fund (BCF) would be assessed. At that time the Board agreed that it would receive quarterly progress reports in relation to the performance measures.

Following that decision and during discussions between the Chair of the Board and the Chair of the Council's Adult Social Care, Health & Wellbeing Sub-Committee, it was suggested that the monitoring of the delivery of the Better Care Fund Plan be undertaken

by the Sub-Committee. This would enable the Board to focus its attention on other priorities, allow the sub-committee to perform its role in reviewing and scrutinising performance management information and avoid duplication.

At its meeting on 4 June 2014 the Adult Social Care, Health & Wellbeing Sub-Committee agreed to regularly monitor delivery of the Better Care Fund plan. Consequently reports have been received by the sub-committee on 9 July, 10 September 2015 and 8 October 2015. Copies of these reports are available on the Council's website.

## 5. Decision options:

The Board may either:-

- a) agree to the Adult Social Care Health & Wellbeing Sub-Committee undertaking the monitoring of the delivery of the Better Care Fund Plan; or
- b) undertake the monitoring itself.

# 6. Reasons for recommended option:

The Board is recommended to agree option a) above as this will enable the Board to focus its attention on other priorities, allow the Adult Social Care Health & Wellbeing Sub-Committee to perform its role in reviewing and scrutinising performance management information and help avoid duplication.
